Mr. and Mrs. Henry F. Wiggins Victims of Revenge, Neighbors Believe.

#### GEORGE WARNER UNDER SUSPICION

Well Known Couple Found Dead by Neighbors—Telephone Gave Alarm
—Believed That Murderer Shot Through Window—Suspect is Sonin-Law of Murdered Man and Woman—Divorce Proceedings Started by Warner's Wife May Have Bearing in Case.

Avis Conley Hayden: "Lucy Terry Prince & Family: One of Vermont's Earliest Black Families" "In this presentation, I will introduce GSV members to Lucy Terry Prince and her family. Lucy was our nation's first African-American poet, and her family was one of the first to settle in Vermont. This presentation will lay out the various genealogical research methods used to learn about the family, where they settled, and their early struggles to get along with neighbors. I have uncovered six generations of descendants but have yet to find a living descendant. Her life was (and is) inspiring in so many ways." Avis Conley Hayden has been researching her family's roots since 1990. She completed a Certificate Program in Genealogical Research from Boston University in 2016. She has published several articles including, most recently, "Widow Lucy Prince and her Heirs, of Sunderland, Vermont" in the Fall 2021 issue of Vermont Genealogy. Back issues of which will be available for purchase.

Mariessa Dobrick: "Documenting the 1914 Simonsville Murders in the State Archives" On the night of November 4, 1914, in the hamlet of Simonsville in Andover, Vermont, former Representative Henry Wiggins and his wife Georgia Wiggins were found murdered on their property. The suspect was their son-in-law, George Warner. The State Archives hold documents that reveal the story of George Warner's trial and eventual execution, the first person executed in Vermont's Electric Chair. How do you research a historic murder? Mariessa Dobrick, reference archivist, will share the kinds of documents in the state archives holdings that can help fill in the narrative on what happened to the victims and the perpetrator. Mariessa Dobrick has been an archivist at the Vermont State Archives since 2011. Prior to that, she worked at the Wisconsin Historical Society in Madison, Wisconsin. She holds a BA in French and a MA with a certificate in Archives and Records Administration from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. An avid genealogist, she delights in helping people find their family stories in unexpected places.

**From Bennington Area:** Follow US 7 North to Exit 4 (Manchester), turn right following VT 11&30 East, continue on VT 11 East towards Peru. Then continue east through Londonderry towards Chester. Just past hamlet of Simonsville, turn left onto Hill Top Rd., to Weston-Andover Rd., then take a right at the bottom of the hill, and another right at the town office. The town hall building is on your left.


**From Burlington Area:** South US Route 7 to Exit 4 (Manchester). (*Same as above after this point*) Alternate Route take I-89 South to I-91 South to Exit 6 (Springfield), follow Route 11 west through Springfield and Chester to Andover Rd., heading west towards Weston. Left hand turn at the town office, the town hall is on your left.

From Brattleboro Area: I-91 North to Exit 6 (Rockingham), follow VT 103 North through Chester, and follow VT 11 West to Andover Rd. (Same as above after this point).

**From Barre**/ **Montpelier Area:** I-89 South to I-91 South, Springfield Exit 7 follow VT 11 West through Springfield to Chester. Follow 11 West through Chester Village West, turn right on Andover Rd. Turn left at Town Office.

Note: The address of 59 Town Hall Rd., is 911 designation and there is no road sign. You turn at the Andover Town Office 953 Weston-Andover Rd., which is clearly marked. The Andover Town Hall is on the left. If you go beyond the town hall you end up at the town garage. Parking in is in the town hall, town office parking lots and along the driveway aka Town Hall Rd.

1909, the town Andover saw an influx of Finnish immigrants, who purchased abandoned (or soon to be abandoned) farms. By the 1920s, more than 30 Finnish families had settled in the area. Even though these families were located throughout the town, the predominate settlement was on East Hill, giving rise to the moniker "Finn Hill." In 1916, Andover's Finnish community formed the Finnish Farmers Co-op, Inc., to purchase much needed farm machinery. This presentation will discuss the history of this thriving group of industrious immigrants who became an integral part of the community. Jonathan W. Stevens is a professional genealogist and the President of the Genealogical Society of Vermont. He is also a Director of the New England Regional Genealogical Consortium and has published several genealogical articles. He is also the Andover Assistant Town Clerk, Lister (VPA I) and Secretary of Zoning Board of Adjustment/Planning Commission.

As noted in my last address, Alice Blakey Marsh, resigned as GSV Secretary earlier this year. # [COMMUNICATED.] OBITUARY.

DIED-At Sunderland, Vt. July 11th, Mrs. Lucy Prince, a woman of colour. From the church and town records where she formerly resided, we learn that she was brought from Bristol, Rhode Island, to Deerfield, Mass. when she was 4 years old, by Mr. Ebenezer Wells: that she was 97 years of age-that she was early devoted to God in baptism: that she united with the church in Deerfield in 1744.—Was married to Abijah Prince, May 17th, 1756, by Elijah Williams, Esq and that she has been the mother of seven children. Her husband was proprietor of some rights of land in this state; but through inattention they were lost, which subjected her to penury. In this remarkable woman there was an assemblage of qualities rarely to be found among her sex. Her volubility was exceeded by none, and in general the fluency of her speech captivated all around her, and was not destitute of instruction and edification. All considered her a prodigy in conversation. She was much respected among her acquaintance, who treated her with a degree of deference. Her knowledge of the holy scriptures was uncommonly great, having a tenacious memory. She had much of it at command, which was a plain indication that the word of God had been her study and delight. Her profession of than half a century, was examplified by a life devoted to the service of God. Suitable respect was shown at her interment, and evidences exhibited, that her memory was precious. A discourse adapted to the occasion, was delivered by the Rev. Mr. Haynes, of Mauchester.

Reprinted from the 1902 and 1908 first editions, newly indexed by Christopher T. Norris and Scott A. Bartley, 323 pp., hardbound. Item No. GSV 3; Sale Price \$20. Reprinted from the first editions of 1908 and 1902, this is an important source of one of Vermont's oldest towns. The town records extend to 1845 and church records from 1773 to 1839. New to this edition is an index of nearly 1,000 names.

*Georgia, Vermont Vital Records.* Peter S. Mallet, ed., 1995, hardbound. Item No. GSV 4; **Sale Price \$15**. This volume presents all births, baptisms, marriages, deaths and burials recorded in the town. All the civil books were transcribed as well as the records from the Georgia Plains Baptist Church, Congregational Church, and Methodist Church of Georgia and North Fairfax.

Windsor County, Vermont Probate Index, 1778-1899. Scott Andrew Bartley and Marjorie-J. Bartley, compilers, 2000, 560 pp., hardbound. Item No. GSV 6; \$45.00 members, \$50.00 non-members. This is a comprehensive index of all files in the Windsor County Probate Court Districts —Windsor and Hartford. The records cover the period from the earliest 1778 records through the end of the nineteenth century, more than 20,000 probate files. The files are indexed by the name of the major party in the case, place of residence, probate district, type of record, year, and probate record volume.

Index to Branches & Twigs, 1972—1995. Robert M. Murphy, ed. 2000, 572 pp., hardbound. Item No. GSV 7; \$58.50 members, \$65.00 non-members. The 180,000 entries include every genealogically important name mentioned in every issue. This book is a comprehensive transcription of census and vital records for Sudbury, plus carefully compiled genealogies of families. This book is among the very best genealogical resources about a Vermont town. This is a cooperative publication between GSV and Picton Press.
