According to the Vermont Vital Record Card Index Lorra Walter, the daughter of Luman Walter was born in Newark, Vt., on 15 May 1821. (upper left) The card asks for the "Maiden Name of Mother," and in most towns the given name is stated, even when the surname was unknown. However the entry here seems to be a much more literal interpretation of the question as "no record" was written. The original record in the town records, not only lists the mother's given name as Hariet [sic] it states that Lorra was not born in Newark, but in Crown Point, N.Y. "Lorra Daughter to Luman and Hariet [sic] Walter Born at Crownpoint [sic] in the State of Newyork [sic] May 15th 1821-Received for Record March 25th 1822 A True Entry Attest Miles Coe Town Clerk." [Newark, Vt., Vital Records, 1: 35] (middle left) Luman Walter married Harriet Howard in Andover on 3 November 1819. [Andover, Vt., Town Records, 2: 191] (bottom of the page). The Newark town records confirmed my suspicion that Lorra was the daughter of Harriet (Howard) Walter, information that was lacking in the card index.

Luman Walter is best known for his connection to Joseph Smith's discovery of the Golden Plates. Walter moved to Sodus, N.Y., and served as a seer for a treasure digs in neighboring Palmyra. Abner Cole, the editor The Reflector, under the name Obadiah Dogberry, Esq. wrote a parody of the "Book of Mormon" called the "Book of Pukei," in which he described the role of "Walters [sic] the Magician." The obituary of Luman Walter, published in the 13 June 1860 issue of the Auburn Weekly Union stated: "Dr. L. Walters, for many years known as a successful but eccentric practitioner of the med-



SAINT ALBANS MUSEUM ANNOUNCES NEW "FARMING FRANKLIN COUNTY"

SAM is also seeking sponsors to help finance this important local history effort - contact the Museum for more information about how you can become involved.





Vital Records of Putney, Vermont to the Year 1900. Compiled and edited by Ken Stevens, 1992, 406 pp. Item No. GSV 2; \$27.00 members, \$30.00 non-members. This is a complete compilation from all primary sources available in the town. This is augmented by the ministerial records of the pastors who served as early as 1776. *out of print*.

Vital Records of Rockingham, Vermont and the Records of the First Church of Rockingham. Reprinted from the 1902 and 1908 first editions, newly indexed by Christopher T. Norris and Scott A. Windsor County, Vermont Probate Index, 1778-1899. Scott Andrew Bartley and Marjorie-J. Bartley, compilers, 2000, 560 pp., hardbound. Item No. GSV 6; \$45.00 members, \$50.00 nonmembers. This is a comprehensive index of all files in the Windsor County Probate Court Districts —Windsor and Hartford. The records cover the period from the earliest 1778 records through the end of the nineteenth century, more than 20,000 probate files. The files are indexed by the name of the major party in the case, place of residence, probate district, type of record, year, and probate record volume.

Index to Branches & Twigs, 1972—1995. Robert M. Murphy, ed. 2000, 572 pp., hardbound. Item No. GSV 7; \$20.00 fall sale price through Dec. 1, 2017. This is the every-name index to GSV's Branches & Twigs, published for 24 years in 96 issues. The 180,000 entries include every genealogically important name mentioned in every issue. Separate sections of this work list the coverage of each Apple Orchard installment, and provide a full author and title index to book reviews. Branches & Twigs included large quantities of information of interest to family historians.
