Records Preservation

GSV continues to solicit proposals for grants of up to \$1000 for projects aimed at preservation of records of interest to Vermont family historians. For example, we recently funded a copy of a three-reel microfilm of records dating back into the eighteenth century of the Congregational Church in Chester. The church was having the filming done; the copy we paid for will be at the Vermont Historical Society and will be available to researchers there. We will also assist with preservation of records of the long defunct Town of Sterling, which was divided in the nineteenth century between Cambridge, Morristown, Johnson, and Stowe. (The records are at Morristown.) There are still many Vermont records which have not been microfilmed or are in precarious condition, and we would like your ideas on how we can help preserve them. Projects to transcribe primary records for publication; indexing records which are inaccessible without indexes, and similar efforts are all worthy of consideration. If you have an idea, let us know, and we will provide guidelines for making a formal application. We don't make that process difficult, but we do need to know something about the proposed project and what it will cost before we can make a final decision.

Vermont Historical Society plans

As many GSV members are well aware, the Vermont Historical Society has

formally acquired the former Spaulding School building in the center of Barre and is moving ahead on transforming it into a headquarters, library, and educational center. The VHS museum in Montpelier's Pavilion Building will remain, but storage in the basement vault, below flood line and critically unsuitable for storage of priceless books and artifacts, will soon be a thing of the past. So will the terribly overcrowded library facilities now at Montpelier. GSV will be asked, as individuals and as an organization, to participate financially in this project. We want to help make a new Vermont Historical Society library the best possible place to do research, and you will be hearing more as the project moves along.

New England Regional Genealogical Conference

Affectionately known as "NERK." After much discussion of potential sites and dates, the next conference has been planned for late October 2003 in Falmouth, Massachusetts. After six conferences, one in each New England state, and major responsibility for a large national conference in Providence, Rhode Island, in 2000, NERGC is taking a bit of a breather. NEW US CENSUS INDICES AT VHS

The Vermont Historical Society has begun to expand its holdings of US census indices and records. The VHS library recently acquired 1870 US census indices for Vermont, New Hampshire and Maine. Hardbound book versions of the indices are available for Vermont and New Hampshire, and all three may be viewed from a compact disc at one of the society's computers. The indices have recently been compiled and published by Heritage Quest, and are a major improvement over indices prepared for other years by Accelerated Indexing Systems. In addition to the information shown in previous indices, those done by Heritage Quest include age, sex, race and birthplace information. A search feature in the compact disk versions allow a user to search by any or all of the fields contained in the index.

The VHS library also purchased Heritage Quest's new index to the 1810 US census. This index provides access to the census for the entire country with 826,349 entries. Previously, indices at the VHS covered only selected states. According to the publisher, this index includes 26,800 individuals not indexed by previous indices.

To accompany the index, the Society was able to purchase Heritage Quest's CD-ROM of the microfilm of the US Census for Vermont. While this new product does not bring full-text searching to the census, it does have several advantages over the microfilm version including non-linear access, the ability to enlarge sections of difficult-to-read handwriting, and printing on a laser printer.

These acquisitions are the first in a number of steps planned to increase the census resources available at VHS. Librarian Paul Carnahan hopes that all Vermont US Census records will be available for viewing at the library, probably on CD ROM, by the time the VHS opens its new education and research center in Barre in the spring of 2002.

BURLINGTON SAVINGS BANK RECORDS, 1854-1895

Just when you thought you'd run out of sources, another one appears! The Vermont Historical Society has recently received a group of 18 old record books donated by KeyBank in Burlington, successor institution to the Burlington Savings Bank.

The Burlington Savings Bank opened for business on January 1, 1848, and operated under that name until 1988 when it merged with the Bank of Boston to become the Bank of Vermont. More recently, it was purchased by KeyBank.

The books donated by KeyBank to the VHS include record books containing customer information, both financial and personal. Included in the collection are four volumes of depositors' ledgers, three volumes of depositors' registers, two volumes of indexes, five volumes of journals, three volumes of miscellaneous transaction record books, and one volume of deposits and semi-annual dividends.

Of greatest interest and value to family researchers will be the depositors' registers, which contain, residences, occupations, ages, birthplaces and references to family relationships. Here are some sample entries:

- 8 Aug. 1874, John C. Berry (transferred to Ellen Berry 3/78), res. Williston, Vt., farmer, age 25, born Canada, married Ellen McGarghan.
- 21 May 1877, Marcus L. Mudgett, res. Essex Center, Vt., farmer, age 25, born Dunham, C.E.
- 19 May 1877, Mary E. Lozon, res. Burlington, Vt., daughter of Joseph Lozon, age 12, born Burlington.
- 22 Apr. 1878, Margaret Kalahan, res. Burlington, Vt., widow of John Kallahan, age abt. 60, born Ireland.
- 23 Sept. 1878, Harry H. Green, res. Burlington, Vt., age 2 yr., 3 mo., born Burlington, dep. by his father Willard E. Green.
- 20 Dec 1879, Mrs. Mary Colgan, res. Shelburne, Vt., age 22, born West Chazy, N.Y., dep. by her husband John Colgan.

As can be seen from the above, this collection contains a veritable treasure trove of information on Burlington Savings

Bank depositors during the mid to late 1800's. It just may contain the information you need to nail down a birthplace or approximate birthdate.

THE WELSH CONNECTION

Vermont's beauty brought film companies to our region last summer. Recently, Poultney's historic George Jones was the primary focus of visit of a film crew based in Hollywood, California and part of alfresco television productions of Cardiff, Wales. Alfresco's work by Senior Producer John Pierce Jones, Researcher Inge Hanson, producers Liz Lloyd Griffiths, Ronw Protheroe, cameraman John Riho and featuring Presenter Marc Freden will air in the United Kingdom beginning in November. The Poultney program most likely will be Program 2 of a six program series entitled, "The Welsh in New York." The program is part of a series of historical documentaries by alfresco which follow another successful production entitled, "The Welsh in Hollywood" that aired on HTV throughout the United Kingdom during September and October 1999 and was very well received.

"The Welsh in New York" will feature stories of famous Welsh-Americans having settled in New York City such as George Jones, Poultney native born in 1811 and co-founder of the *New York Times*, Samuel Ellis, Ellis Island legacy, and Robert Edwards, the Edwards Millions legacy of Manhattan. The documentary then branches out to regions where the Welsh went after coming through Ellis Island including such areas as Scranton, Pennsylvania, Poultney, Vermont and New Haven, Connecticut's Yale University that was founded by philanthropist Elihu Yale, a Welshman.

Successful filming was completed in historic East Poultney. Several sites fre-

quented by George Jones were featured. They included the Baptist Church where Jones and his family attended worship; the Horace Greeley House, site of the *Northern Spectator* newspaper where Jones learned the printing trade; and the Eagle Tavern and General Store. Indoor and outdoor footage at the George Jones homestead included interview about George Jones.

George Jones and his family were settlers in Poultney nearly 50 years before the influx of Welsh immigrants who settled the Slate Valley due to the slate industry. But, because alfresco is from Wales, Senior Producer John Pierce Jones designated segments of the work by the crew to include portions of the Welsh in the slate history era in this valley. Discovering a Poultney resident who was related to his family in North Wales, John Pierce Jones was pleased to instruct the crew to secure footage of our slate history as well as interview of his family connection - Elizabeth "Liz" Evans. Elizabeth came to South Poultney, Vermont in 1922 leaving her home in Brynrefail, North Wales at the age of 15 years.

A number of Slate Valley residents made themselves available and assisted in this visit in numerous varied ways in order to promote our Welsh heritage and the local region. Having given my help and knowledge to alfresco in organizing their requests for the crew, this writer extends special thanks to each of the local volunteers for their willingness to be involved.

THE SLATE VALLEY

A historical marker in Fair Haven on Scotch Hill Road reads: "FIRST SLATE QUARRY IN WESTERN VERMONT This area of Vermont is known for its high quality slate, the first quarry was opened on Scotch Hill in 1839 by Alanson Allen & Caleb Ranney. Allen began the first manufacture of roofing slate in Vermont in 1848. By 1869 there were seventeen quarries in Fair Haven of which

eleven were on Scotch Hill. Quarrying of slate was important to the economy of the area and brought in many skilled Welsh immigrants who were familiar with the quarrying of slate in their native Wales."

These Welsh quarrymen carved numerous gravestones from this very hard red or black slate. The red slate is only found in this area of the world. Today, after over 100 years, most of these stones are in nearly perfect condition. The majority of these stones stand in the West Street Cemetery in Fair Haven and the Elmwood Cemetery in Middle Granville, NY.

A red slate stone stands in the Elmwood cemetery and translates: "In Memory of Mary Jane, dau. of John J. & Jane Hughes, formerly of Fistinog, North Wales, she who died Dec. 10, 1858 at age 4 y. Also, y Dywededig, John J. Hughes, he who died June 9, 1860 at age 36 y. Signed "J. R. Williams" who was John R. of Poultney, born in Bangor, Wales, came to the United States in 1845, and with his brother William R., settled in Poultney in 1866 where they engaged in the manufacturing of slate in their mill.
